The **granny knot** is dangerous and untrustworthy. One moment it slips, the other it jams.

Everybody enjoyed themselves though and there is always next year.

At the annual Assault Course Challenge at Southwood Activity Centre, Tolworth, we put in two teams (the only Scoutentries)—Alastair Waddell, Michael King, Jonathan Burr and James Mitchell, and a mixed team of Alex Newman, Bassie Tyndall, Alexis Childs and Karen Loizou. The conditions were wet and muddy, but both did extremely well, with very good times, the mixed team attaining the fasted time and picking up a nice trophy. Well done all!

Remembrance Sunday was very cold and raw – Leander PLs, APLs and ·Leaders were the only Scout representatives on parade, but all looked very smart handing out hymn sheets and carrying out duties in the Church.

The Night Hike, which we were organising, had a very poor response from the rest of the District (we had at least three teams keen to take part), so we had no alternative but to postpone the event until next March. Fifteen Scouts and two Leaders recently went skating at the Spectrum Centre at Guildford. Going by train from Surbiton worked very well, but no group reductions for short distance rail travel any more. Nippiest skaters were Oliver Seely and Matthew King, neither of whom had ever been on the ice before. For those who could not go this time, there will be another session after Christmas.

A large number of proficiency Badge books have been distributed, with plenty of badges now being gained. Amongst the new badges that have recently been introduced is a Pulling Badge, which the whole troop should be able to get!

Forestry skills have recently been put to use, as we had to take down the large poplar tree at the back of the Headquarters – it was pushing the fence down and was also beginning to rot. Over two weekends, felling axes were wielded and the task was accomplished very efficiently.

noticeable improvement in uniform standards – regular inspections must be having some effect.

#### from the Scout Association

New legislation has recently been introduced to increase the safety of young people taking part in adventurous activities. The activities concerned are, in general terms: caving, climbing, trekking and water sports. You may have read, or seen, that some centres which provide instruction in such activities need to be licensed. These are generally those centres operating in a commercial manner – when payment for instruction is made.

The Scout Association – along with many other voluntary youth organisations – is exempt from the requirements to be licensed, under most circumstances. However, I wish to assure all parents that The Scout Association has for many years operated a policy which ensures that the safety of our members, taking part in adventurous activities, is given the highest priority.

Before starting any adventurous activity Leaders and Instructors must apply to be authorised to lead or supervise the party. They have to show that they have the skills to work with young people and also that they are competent in the chosen activity. A practical assessment of these skills is usually required. We work very closely with National Governing Bodies (such as the British Canoe Union and the Mountain Leader 'Training Board) and our Leaders/Instructors are encouraged to continue their training – to gain nationally recognised qualifications in the chosen activity.

## Rowing hints from the Guild News sheet

### Gig Rowing - Some reminders

The legs slightly bent. If in doubt "overstretcher" rather than under.

Hands about 6" apart with the outer little finger pressing against the end of the loom.

Recognise that a lever system is in operation where, contrary to general belief, the boat is the load, you are the effort and the blade/water is the fulcrum. In other words the blade should stay stationary and the boat move past it.

Use the flats on the button as much as possible to get a good feather on the return and a square entry on the catch.

On the return keep the blade as close to the water as possible and get a good catch at the furthermost part of the stroke. A high blade leads to an "air shot".

Hold the feather as long as you can. (If you were in an 'eight' you would be told to start to rotate at the mid stroke position,. You would however be rowing at twice the speed and hence only have half. the time).

Make sure you enter square. Under-square causes the blade to go deep; you only want it covered and the centre of gravity as far from the boat as possible.

Reach into the stroke as much as possible and stretch the arms. At the beginning of the power stroke keep the arms stretched, or straight, bringing the whole body back and then pull it upright by bringing the loom into the belly button. Aim to be compact by bringing the elbows close to the body. Keep the eyes horizontal. Keep the stroke long.

Don't do yourself a mischief.
