Annual Surbiton Peak District Expedition

On Friday the 12th of February Ruth and I arrived at Surbiton Headquarters after a short briefing the previous day to depart on our trip to the Peak district. The trip was open to all Surbiton Ventures and Scouts aged 13 and above. Thanks to the invitations by Leander to Surbiton to the past two summer camps, all Leander Scouts and Ventures were invited to attend the Peak District camp with Surbiton. Unfortunately, only two scouts from Leander (Ruth Osborne and Emily Rhoades) were able to attend.

After the last bags were packed into the mini bus where the ventures would be travelling, the people carrier where the scouts would travel, and the MG where Ruth and Tim would travel in style, we began our journey to the Peak District. We arrived at the small, yet comfortable, scout hut at around ten o'clock that night where we unpacked and settled into our accommodation. We than played a game of 'Alcoholics Anonymous' as suggested by Andrew Burns where everyone in the room takes a turn at describing someone else in the room. The game was quite interesting, as deep dark secrets were unburied regarding members of the Surbiton Scout troop.

Early Saturday morning we were awoken and dressed quickly as we awaited the long day of activities ahead of us. The morning started off with a trip to a disused railway bridge around 60 feet above the ground. Only two members of the group seemed even slightly worried by this height as most had abseiled off it before, but for Mark Bridger and myself it was a totally new and disturbing experience. The activities started off with a climb up a caving ladder that was only about 5 inches wide, this proved a problem with the boys who had slightly wider and longer feet as it was more of an effort to get their feet through.

We then ate our lunches which we packed earlier that morning and then travelled to our next adventure of climbing up the steep rock face twenty minutes away from our last climbing exercise. As we all watched in disbelief and horror as Bruno scaled the 60-foot cliff, the first fully equipped scout began to climb. After all had their share of climbing we sat and watched the brotherly competition between Andrew and Richard Beddingfield. Andrew was determined to regain his title of the fastest and most skilful climber of the family from the previous year, until he was beaten by over 10 seconds by Richard on the most difficult of the three climbs.

After the climbing, cold and tired, we went to visit the local caf where Andrew Burns kindly bought us all hot chocolate and chips. We then travelled back to our hut where we ate dinner and played yet another game. 'Taboo' proved to show how more skilful the Moshino print trousers were than the Dapadons as they thrashed us. It must be said that we had a slight disadvantage as half our team left for the pub during the last few minutes of the game.

The next morning we were again woken early. We ate breakfast and prepared our day sacks for both our hiking and caving expeditions. The hiking was planned the previous night using compass bearings and a map. The hike proved difficult as it meant climbing up two very difficult steep hills. We then drove onto our caving destination. The caving was amazing. It was funny to see those who found their height an extreme advantage in climbing to struggling in caving, as those who found their short height and extreme disadvantage during climbing found the caving easy. Everyone completed all the tasks set in the caving although a few found it difficult. Our caving route took us through three 'ponds' which to our luck and due to the lack of percolation during the past few months came no further than knee high. Some people although had to wade and crawl through the water in hiking boots, as they didn't bring their wellies. Exhausted, we all exited the caves pleased to see sunlight. Our evening then ended in another game. This time of 'Outburst' when the Dapadons and Moshino Print Trousers battled it out yet again - this time the winner was again the Moshino print trousers. We then went to bed after the brief celebration of Ruth's birthday. On Monday morning some of us were treated to a lie-in as Richard Beddingfield and Daniel Jackson kindly made breakfast for the whole troop. A visit to the Boat Show in January is a regular event, a good opportunity to see the latest designs, play with the satellite navigation systems and acquire wet suits and sailing gear at very good prices.

We were fortunate to gain an entry to the Royal Navy **Recognised Sea Scout Group National Swimming** Championship, which we have not been able to get into for the last few years. A group of nine scouts and two leaders travelled to Torpoint; Plymouth in February, for a very intensive weekend of activities at HMS Raleigh. Apart from swimming, there was a fiercesomely competitive six-a-side football competition, seamanship, pioneering, quizes and physical skills activities. Considering that many of the teams entered seemed to consist of very good swimmers who train all year round for this event, we didnOt do too badly, coming 14th out of 30 troops. A special mention for Oliver Seeley who, because we had one too many in the team(!), volunteered to swim for a group from Tyneside.

Emily Rhoades and Ruth Osbourne decided to try the rigours of winter in the wilds, joining a party of Scouts and Ventures from Surbiton Sealions who went to Fenney Bentley Scout Centre in the Derbyshire Peak Dristrict for a long weekend abseilng and hill walking.

We had a very successful inter patrol cooking competition, for which every patrol worked out a menu to provide a three course meal. It was quite a sight to see five patrols preparing and cooking a meal on the main deck, just using the camping stoves and patrol boxes. The tasting panel, Ventures and Leaders, were inpressed by the high standard and I am sure the event will be repeated by popular request. Consequently we were able to enter a team in March into the County Cooking Championships – Ruth Osbourne, George Mitchell, Jack Young and Alex Kearns came 6th equal, a very creditable result for our first attempt.
