Luckily this year we have been able to start regular canoeing sessions again, as Chris Hampton, an experienced canoe instructor (and star euphonium player in the Kingston and Malden District Band) has been able to come along every fortnight. Incredibly, the rain stayed away and the tents remained dry. Drying out that amount of tents and large marquees in the headquarters would have been an absolute nightmare.

As camp leader, my job was very straightforward, just making sure the schedule worked and activities happened at the right time. With families divided up into four teams, very ably led by Karen, Ian, Buffy and Carl, everyone had the chance to try archery, rifle shooting, the climbing wall or assault course, field games and orienteering. Because of time, the orienteering course had to be shortened after it started, but the majority of families found the controls and turned in some pretty good times. Of course there is always one family who become spectacularly lost and even won a prize for it!

The camp fire, under Chris Feltham's inspired leadership, was a great success – who will forget the stunning performance of the two coachman and the

highwayman and for those who stayed up, hearing the complete Beatles, Don McClean and Simon and Garfunkel repertoire?
