The week after the Group Family Camp we had a fire-building demonstration, learning about types of wood, how to create a fire, safety rules etc., with three leaders creating a fire.

Over the half term, Cubs collected suitable wood, which they then brought in and made a fire in their own Sixes. They then baked chocolate bananas, and cooked dough twists.

In June, as part of the Thames Watch Project, Cubs split into two groups (one towards Teddington lock and the other towards Kingston bridge) and logged the birds spotted. They saw nothing rare – just the usual ducks and swans – but they had a good time trying to spot about ten different types we were looking for. The results were submitted as part of a Thames-wide study.

A good time was had by all climbing the wall at Thames Young Mariners.

Cubs were able to have some experience kayaking, when, for two weeks, they split into two groups – one on the river in kayaks the other playing football. The first evening was lovely, and, although the weather not quite as good the second week, they all loved going on the water !

For our tracking evening in preparation for the Navigator Badge, it was pouring with rain but most of the Cubs turned out for a great evening running about in Isabella plantation. Some Cubs had to be rescued by the leaders as the appointed driver went to the wrong car park!

The term finished with the 'Flag' Wide Game on the Richmond Park

polo field, followed by a picnic. Special mention to Arjun's mum for some fantastic biscuits!
