There are quite a few nautical skills to learn, so we'll be making sure that we put on a good show on the night. Leander has a long tradition of well run inspections that ensure that our RN recognition continues - there is no room for complacency as we have to convince the Inspecting Officer that we meet the rigorous standards required of Royal Navy Recognised Units.

After a long gap of a few years we hope to be able to put on a Fire Safety Badge course with the local Fire Brigade, this is an important badge that every Scout should gain. We would also like to step up the badgework, as there are many opportunities for Scouts to deploy hobbies and skills that can gain appropriate badges. It would help immensely if parents could provide a little encouragement; every Scout is given a badge book when they are invested. For many of the activities or skills, such as music, art, cycling, etc., certificates or levels gained will automatically qualify for a badge.

We have had an enthusiastic bunch of Cubs come up to the Troop this Autumn, a warm welcome to Charly Ward, Max Talman, Dominic Jackson and Cameron Frame, who should all be invested before RN Inspection.

As our valiant Scout and Explorer sixa-side football teams battled it out at HMS Excellent, Portsmouth, the District Swimming Gala took place at Westcroft Leisure Centre, Carshalton. Despite being a very young team and a little short on numbers, Leander managed a very credible 4th place out of 10 teams.

The District 'MAD' day at Polyapes camp site at the beginning of October was a great success, a multi-activity day in which Scouts could participate in six-a-side football, chess, archery, target shooting, cyclocross and a cooking competition. Hopefully next year we will come first in all our races!


